FCC Lompoc Staff Member Receives Department of Labor Award

FCC Lompoc Executive Assistant Melinda Clark recently received the Department of Labor (DOL) Secretary's Exceptional Achievement Award for her outstanding work reviewing grants for the Incarcerated Veterans Transition Program (IVTP). The IVTP provides referral and counseling services to assist in the reintegration and transition of formerly incarcerated veterans meaningful employment. Ms. Clark was a key member of the 2010 grant review teams in her previous role as Faith-based and Community Reentry Coordinator,

Correctional Programs Division, in the Central Office. Her input contributed to the selection of 16 IVTP grants in 13 states; the grants are projected to serve an estimated 1,400 veterans. Of the IVTP, Secretary of Labor Hilda L. Solis stated: "Everyone deserves a second chance, especially the men and women who have sacrificed for our country. These grants will help open doors back into the workplace for veterans, and allow them to contribute positively both to the nation's economic recovery and society as a whole." The Bureau's National Reentry Affairs Branch continues to work in conjunction with the DOL and the Veterans Administration to develop reentry initiatives for incarcerated and releasing veterans.

FCC Victorville Establishes Employee Exchange Training Program with U.S. Probation Office

FCC Victorville and the U.S. Probation and Pretrial Services Office for the Central District of California

recently initiated a two-week employee exchange training program – a first within the Bureau. During the first week, U.S. Probation Officers (USPO) visited FCC Victorville and learned about institution operations and the responsibilities of the various departments. They observed Receiving and Discharge procedures and the Challenge program where they participated in an open forum with inmates. The USPO staff also learned how an assessment plan is developed and used to help inmates prepare for release.

During the second week, FCC Victorville staff visited the U.S. Probation Office. Chief USPO Michelle Carey and her deputies welcomed the group. They spent the day with Pre-Trial Services staff and the Pre-Sentence Investigation Branch. The group learned about various types of technology used to track offenders in the community and shadowed Probation Officers conducting field work.

FCC Allenwood Reentry Staff Attend C.A.R.E. Court

Recently, FCC Allenwood Reentry **Affairs** Coordinators Jennifer Reigel and Yvonne Bennage were invited to make a presentation for the Court Assisted Reentry (C.A.R.E) Program team for the Middle District of Pennsylvania. Their presentation highlighted the various reentry programs offered at FCC Allenwood. The C.A.R.E. program, presided over by The Honorable William I. Arbuckle III, Magistrate Judge, is part of the Court's comprehensive approach to assist offenders in making a successful transition back to the community. The two-year long program makes a wide variety of social services available to offenders and includes one year of intensive case management, frequent drug tests, and monthly court sessions, followed by a second year of traditional supervision. Individuals who successfully complete the program may have their term of supervised release terminated early.
